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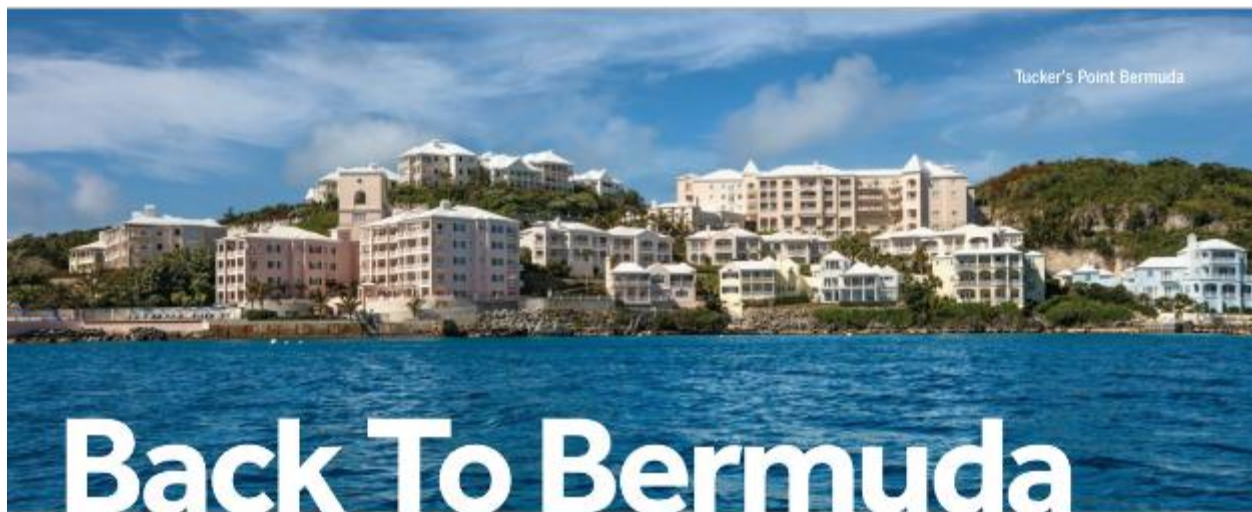

# Back To Bermuda

Featuring close proximity to the U.S., world-renowned beaches, natural beauty, and more golf courses per capita than anywhere else on the planet, Bermuda is a vacation paradise. But if you wanted to own a home there, good luck. Government restrictions designed to keep most properties out of the hands of foreigners

made buying a home (especially an expensive one) nearly impossible.

Until now.

Tucker's Point Bermuda, a Gencom project, has released a dozen estate homesites available for purchase by non-Bermudians. Priced from \$800,000 to \$3 million, the sites offer panoramic views of

the ocean and Tucker's Point Golf Course.

The developer says it is devoting millions to elevate the already illustrious Tucker's Point address into "the hottest destination for the global elite." More residential offerings are expected, including the relaunch of sales at Harbor Court, a luxury residence club, in 2019.

## Launch Pad

Some first jobs are better than others. Just ask golf course architect Bobby Weed, who recently finished a renovation of Long Cove Club's private golf course on Hilton Head Island, S.C. The course, rated No. 1 in the state for 10 consecutive years by *Golf Digest*, was designed by Pete Dye in 1981.

Weed was on the original crew of college grads, interns, and low-handicappers that has been touted as one of the most eccentric and legendary course-building teams of recent years. Among the others was Tom Doak, Pete's son PB Dye, Scott Pool, and Ron Farris, all now architects in their own right. Besides being Weed's first assignment with Dye, Long Cove marked the beginning of a decades-long association with the legend even after he formed his own firm, Bobby Weed Golf Design, in 1994. "Returning to Long Cove conjured up fond memories of insane hours of construction, working alongside Pete Dye every day, and fashioning a course out of the Lowcountry with a passionate team of golf junkies," Weed says. "And doing all of this while covered in sunscreen, no-see-ums, and chiggers!"

Weed's renovation prepared the course for the next several decades. Among the tasks was restoring all the bunkers and native waste areas to their original limits and returning the native landscaping to its original palette.
